We are putting in a submission to express our absolute lack of confidence in the WA State Government when it comes to addressing climate change on a timeline and scale commensurate to the challenge.

It is clear as a state we are not on track to reduce our greenhouse gas emissions. Whilst we need all levels of government globally to be urgently reducing their reliance on fossil fuels, the WA State Government is working to provide all the support it can to fossil fuel companies including Chevron, Shell, Mineral Resources, Inpex and Woodside, enabling their continued harmful activities.

The WA State Government has made it clear it is not willing to do what is required to protect the health and well-being of the population from the harms of climate change.

We share our solidarity with staff working within the WA State Government on climate policy and acknowledge their best intentions. We understand their limitations. We note our formal concerns relating to the psychosocial hazards present in their workplaces.
